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On Thursday, June 4, Sierra Business Council held an organizing meeting in the Kernville Community Room led by SBC President Steve Frisch and Sahara Saude. 21 people attended the meeting and agreed to take steps to create a local steering committee and set up a Southern Sierra Think Local First Program, much like 4 others set up in other part of the Sierra.

On Monday, July 6, 18 local community members met and set up a steering committee to work toward a Think Local First Southern Sierra Campaign.

Jim Davis reports on that meeting:

This is a grass roots effort to promote businesses and organizations of our community to increase awareness of our citizens in our community to support locally owned businesses and organizations first whenever they can. An 8 person steering committee has been developed for the Think Local First Southern Sierra campaign. In addition to the community members the steering committee will be made up of representatives from Kern River Valley Revitalization (KRVR) and both the Kernville and the Kern River Valley Chambers of Commerce. Next meetings are scheduled for August 3, 2009 and September 8, 2009 at the Kernville Community Room (next to the Kernville Chamber office) at the corner of Sierra Way and Kernville Road.
